A quorum being present, the Chairman called the meeting to order to transact any and all business that may properly come before the board.

On motion of Milne, seconded by Faber, the minutes of the regular meeting held September 6th and September 18th were approved of as published in the Cheektowaga Record, the official newspaper of the Town of Cheektowaga, New York.

Communications from various associations, namely, Cheektowaga Citizens Inc., Cheektowaga Boosters Club Inc., Allied Societies of St. John Gualbertus Parish, Citizens and Taxpayers Assn. of Walden Avenue, and Rev. P.J. Adamski, Recotr of St. John Gualbertus Parish, protesting against the erection of an asphalt mixing plant in the vicinity of Walden Avenue, were presented and read.

On motion of Sturm, seconded by Milne, the building petition of the Malthat Kolite Corp. for permission to erect an asphalt mixing plant, was denied.

On motion of Sturm, seconded by Milne, the monthly reports of Judge Faber, Milne, and Judge Platek, also the monthly report of Town Clerk Sturm, were ordered received and filed.

Mr. Lawrence Hell, President of the Aero Club of Buffalo expressed his thanks in behalf of the Club, and also the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Buffalo, to the members of the Town Board and Police Department for the splendid cooperation extended to them on Saturday and Sunday, September 30 and October 1st, during their air races.

Communication from the Cheektowaga Citizens Assn. Inc. to the Town Board relative to the bond of the Tax Collector, was read, and referred to the Supervisor.

Communication from Kathryn Long, District Clerk of Pine Hill Union Free School #11, relative to a traffic signal at the intersection of Delavan and Andrew Streets, stating that this was a dangerous corner and that some protection should be afforded the children who are crossing this intersection during school hours.

This communication was referred to the Supervisor and the Chief of Police.

On motion of Sturm, seconded by Faber, the invitation from the Doyle Hose Co. No. 2 to attend their Annual Dance on Saturday, October 14, was ordered ~~xx~~ accepted and received and filed.

Judge Milne offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Judge Faber.

WHEREAS, owners representing at least one-half of the taxable real estate owned by residents owners situated in the part of the Town of Cheektowaga, petitioned the Town Board for the collection and disposition of all ashes, refuse or other indestructible matter swill or garbage in the part of the Town of Cheektowaga described as follows:

ALL THAT TRACT OR PARCEL OR PARCEL OF LAND, situated in the Town of Cheektowaga, County of Erie and State of New York, described as follows:-

BEGINNING at a point on the south side of Kensington Avenue in the farm lot 37, Township 11, Range 7, Town of Cheektowaga, Erie County, New York, said point being the intersection of south line of Kensington Avenue with the west line of lands now owned or formerly owned by M.A. Welker, thence north easterly along south line of Kensington Avenue to the north line of the Town of Cheektowaga, thence easterly along the north line of Town of Cheektowaga to the center line of Beach Road formerly known as the Forest Road thence southwesterly along the center line of Beach Road to the northeast corner of lands now or formerly owned by John W. Ostwald, thence westerly along the north line of said John W. Ostwald, thence east line of the subdivision known as Woods Subdivision Cover 1303 filed in Erie County Clerk's Office, this point also being the southwest corner of land now or formerly owned by Henry Welker, thence southerly along the east line of the Woods' Subidivision to the southeast corner of the said Subidivision said point being the intersection of the east line of said Subidivision with the north line farm lot number 26, Township 11, Range 7, thence westerly along the north line of farm lot #26, Township 11, Range 7, to the southeast corner of lands now owned of formerly owned by Byron Arend, thence northerly along the east line of said land to the northeast corner, thence westerly along north line of said land to the center line of Harlem Road, thence northerly along the center line of Harlem Road to the northeast corner of land now owned or formerly owned by George Pl Urban, thence westerly along the north line of said land to the northwest corner of said lands this point also being the southwest corner of lands now or formerly owned by F.X. Jerger, thence northerly along the west line of lands now or formerly owned by F.X. Jerger and the west line of land now or formerly owned by M.A. Welker to the point of beginning.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a public hearing be held therein at the Town Hall, inthe Town of Cheektowaga, New York, on the 16th day of October, 1933 at 3:30 o'clock P.M. at which time full opportunity to be heard will be granted to all interested persons, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that at such time the Superintendent of Highways of this Town submit to this Town Board an estimate of the maximum cost of such collection and disposition of waste matter and that a public hearing to be held thereon at the same time and place, pursuant to Section 477-A of the Town Law, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a public notice be given pursuant to statute of bath such hearings.

FREDERICK K. WING, submitted his sixth progress report on his investigation of Sewer District No. 5, which was duly read to the Board and on motion of Faber, seconded by Sturm this report was received and filed for further consideration.

## Sixth Progress Report.

To the Honorable  
The Town Board,  
Cheektowaga.

Gentlemen:-

We will confine ourselves in this, our sixth progress report, of our investigation of the sewer system in Sewer District No. 5 - to two general topics,- 1st. - criticisms of the disposal plant and recommendations as to changes or additions to be made therein,- and, 2nd.,- to a discussion of Kenda Company's bid, and an analysis of same, showing how Spacone's prices applied to the work actually done, would have cost the Town less.

The pump station at the disposal plant, as designed and built, contains two pumps of 2000 g.p.m. capacity each. One pump alone has too large a capacity for the flow that can be taken care of at the dosing tanks of the sprinkling filters. The feeds, siphons and sprinkling filters are designed for a maximum flow of 1,111 g.p.m. and an average flow of 850 g.p.m. When both pumps are running and discharging a flow of 4,000 g.p.m. into the Imhoff tank, we are advised that the Imhoff tank walls cannot retain the sewage and it overflows the walls and onto the ground. Even if the Imhoff tanks could take care of that amount of sewage, by having its walls built up high enough to increase the "head" sufficiently, to force the sewage through the 24 inch cast iron pipe from the Imhoff tank to the dosing tanks,- the "feeds" which control the flow into the dosing tanks, could not take care of that rate of flow and the sewage would spill over onto the ground at that point.

The feeds at the entrance to the dosing tanks are so designed and built that they operate alternately,- permitting one dosing tank to fill and then be shut off. The air control then permits the other dosing tank to fill while the first one discharges its dose of sewage onto one of the sprinkling filter beds. The second tank then discharges its contents on the second sprinkling filter.

It would not be economical to build new impellers for the pumps to reduce their flow, so, in order to take the sewage as pumped at the rate of 2000 g.p.m., it will be necessary to leave the air cocks on the top of both of these feed open. This will permit both of the dosing tanks to receive sewage at the same time in an amount that the feeds and siphons can handle properly. I therefore recommend that the air cocks on top of the feeds be left open. I also recommend that the concrete weir leading to the easterly dosing tank be cut down to the same level as the other weir. It is now about a half inch higher and unless cut down, will cause less flow to reach the easterly sprinkling filter bed than would reach the other one.

At the Imhoff tank it would not be economical at the present time, to eliminate the cast iron pipe distributors and build concrete troughs in their places,- although it would have cost less in the first place and would have saved money on the cost of power every day the plant was operated.

A bad feature at the tank is the discharging of the sludge into troughs along the sides of the tanks before it enters the 8" cast iron pipe leading to the sludge drying bed. This sludge should be discharged from the Imhoff tank through a continuous pipe to the sludge drying bed. I therefore recommend that you have Mr. Passmore, the operator at the disposal plant, take some of the superfluous cast iron pipe that is not being used in the sludge drying bed, and make a continuous pipe line from the valves at the walls of the Imhoff tank to the pipes leading to the sludge drying beds. As this wall uses up only about 100 feet out of the superfluous seven hundred feet or more of this cast iron pipe, you might sell the remaining six hundred feet of pipe and the forty superfluous 8" valves that are not used or needed, and get money enough to help make the earth fill around the Imhoff tank, which I am recommending. The Plan adopted by the designing engineers,- of sticking tanks and piping containing sewage up in the air, instead of filling earth around them, is certainly not wise, and shows a lack of experience in operating plants in this climate.

The best way to insulate these exposed pipes which carry the sewage to the Imhoff tank and away from it, is to bank up earth around the tank so as to cover these pipes sufficiently to prevent their freezing. The necessity for this is apparent when we consider the fact that the influent line is an 18" cast iron pipe and is always full of sewage from the ground up to the invert of the main distributor on top of the Imhoff tank. This distance in the open air, and unprotected from the frost, is 17 feet. Usually the coldest part of the 24 hours of a day is at night when the sewage flow is the smallest and interval between pumpings (which would cause movement of the sewage and thus prevent its freezing) is the longest. A similar condition exists as to the effluent pipe leading from the Imhoff tank to the dosing tanks at the sprinkling filters. At the Imhoff tank and at the dosing tanks this 24" cast iron pipe extends upward from the ground in the open air and always has sewage in it to a height of eleven feet above the ground.

There is plenty of room north and south of the Imhoff tank to make earth fills up to within one foot of the top of the tank, having the fill 4 feet in width at this elevation, - to provide walks for the operator, and then have a proper slope down to the present ground. As there is limited space between the Imhoff tank and the fence to the west, the fill can be made here only to within 2-1/2 feet of the top of the Imhoff tank. Between the Imhoff tank and the sludge drying bed to the east there is only 13-1/2 feet of space left, although this space on the plans scales 19 feet. This shrunken distance does not permit making a fill that will cover all the exposed sewage filled piping. A limited height on these pipes could be covered with earth and the balance covered with an insulating material.

By making the fill around the Imhoff tank you will also be accomplishing another requirement for properly operating this part of the plant. The operator should have a safe place to work on tanks such as these, - in the hosing of the walls to keep them clean, in the breaking up of the scum in the vents and the skimming of the scum that floats on the sewage in the flowing through channels. As it is at present, the operator must climb a vertical ladder on the side of the tank and must perform his duties by walking on top of 18" walls with the ground seventeen feet below him on one side and a tank full of sewage on the other. That is not a safe place for a man to work.

And at the center of the tank where one vent is located and where the operator must see that the scum is broken up, - the 16" cast iron main distributor pipe covers the 24" vent opening almost completely and the operator must walk on top of this pipe or straddle it with his feet on the 8" walls of the vent. He must also climb over the lateral distributors at each end of the tank and swing himself around the 16" gate valves that extend up above the main distributor. To prevent these perils, a walk made of sectional iron gratings should be built over this vent, and the side vents for the length of the tank and it should be provided with railings on each side. A railing should also be provided all around the entire tank, - to prevent any one falling into the tank, an accident which might prove to be a fatality.

Similarly at the dosing tanks, - I recommend making an earth fill under and around them, and covering the 14" cast iron pipes leading from the siphons to the sprinkling filter beds, - to prevent them from freezing any more. The welds on these pipes and the iron straps around them, show that they have frozen and burst and have been repaired. Your operator, Mr. Passmore, tells me he has had to build a fire under the dosing tanks and thaw out the siphons when they have frozen, in order to continue the operation of the plant.

Also, - nozzles have frozen in the sprinkling filter beds. To lessen this trouble, - I recommend two remedies. First, tap a 1" nipple into the cast iron pipe just inside the wall of the trough of the filter bed and install a 1" bleeder valve such as is made by the American Car & Foundry Co., - with a stem extending up through the concrete platform where the other valve stems have their wheels for opening and closing. The operator can open this valve in the winter and bleed down the liquid in the riser pipes in the sprinkling filters. Experience will teach him how to open this valve so as not to lower the liquid in the risers too much between discharged from the dosing tank. A bleeder should also be installed on the other filter bed.

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The second recommendation is that you build a wooden cover over the open top of the troughs into which the discharge of the liquid from the filter bed floor empties. You can use these covers in the winter to prevent the cold air blowing into these troughs and through the under-drains and up through the filter stone, - thereby causing the iron piping to freeze and burst. The expense you have just been adjacent to the middle header in the easterly sprinkling filter bed, is sufficient proof that something should be done to prevent a recurrence of that trouble. As an additional precaution you can bank earth all around your sprinkling filter beds. This would tend also to keep them warmer in winter. For the safety of the operator there should also be an iron railing around the top of the walls of the entrance chamber and fees of the dosing tanks, - or the earth fill should be carried up to the level of the top of these walls.

A small item, but one which bears on the knowledge and qualifications of the authors of the specifications, - occurs in Article 154 of the Specifications, - which reads as follows: "INTERMITTENT SIPHON". 154. The intermittent siphon shall be built of second class concrete and as shown on the plans." Siphons are not built of concrete. They are built of cast iron.

Another item that is not so small, however, is the omission on the part of the Kenda Co. to build a reinforced concrete wall just south of the Imhoff tank. This wall is shown on Sheet 42 of the plans of the disposal plant, and the following directions are printed within the outlines of the wall: "This 14' height of future adjacent tank wall is to be built when 1st. tank is built." This wall is the lower 14 feet of the northerly wall of the next southerly Imhoff tank, as shown on Sheet 54A. of the plans. The top of this wall would have extended from one to two feet above the ground line. I have tested it with a rod driven 2-1/2 feet below ground in the location shown on the plans, but there is no such wall built there. This unbuilt wall was to have been 14' high and 63 feet long (the length of the Imhoff tank), and would have contained 78.2 cubic yards of reinforced concrete, and there would have been 238 cubic yards of earth excavation. The unit price for reinforced concrete in the Kenda proposal is \$30 per cubic yard and the final estimate allowed a price of \$1.50 for excavation which is much shallower than this. 78.2 cubic yards of reinforced concrete at \$30, - amounts to \$2,246, - and 238 cubic yards of excavation at \$1.50, amounts to \$357, - a total of \$2,603. The engineers should either have had the contractors build this wall, as called for on the plans, or about \$2,603 should have been deducted from the price of the disposal plant. Neither of these things was done.

Another recommendation is in regard to your chlorinating apparatus. Your present equipment consists of a Wallace & Tiernan dry feed chlorinator. During the past summer you have installed a water line to your plant, and you should now change your chlorinator and install a Wallace & Tiernan solution feed type in its place. This latter type is much more efficient in that it gives a more uniform distribution of the chlorine, and has no diffusor to clog up or break off. Inasmuch as the State Health Department now required duplicate installations in all new plants, - I would therefore recommend a duplicate installation of this solution feed type.

The subject of the letting of the contract for construction of a sewerage system and disposal plant in sewer district No. 5, Town of Cheektowaga, to the Kenda Construction Co., Inc., as the lowest bidder, is one which in view of all the circumstances should receive serious consideration. Let us consider what steps should be taken before a contract is let.

First, - The Town should ascertain whether the District to be served is in need of the proposed improvement, and whether the property to be taxed to pay for it, is capable of bearing the burden of paying these taxes that would be levied to pay for it.

Second, - if the decision in the first step is in the affirmative, the next step is to employ a competent engineer to plan and supervise the necessary construction.

Third,- After the plans and specifications are completed and approved by the State authorities and a proposal sheet has been prepared by the Engineer,- the Town should advertise for bids.

Fourth,- When the bids are received, they should be referred to the Engineer for a report as to the lowest responsible bidder. The report which should be in writing, should make a definite recommendation and should be made a part of the minutes of the meeting at which it is received.

Fifth,- The Town Board should then consider the Engineer's report as to the lowest responsible bidder, and if in agreement with the Engineer's recommendation, should let the contract to the bidder recommended by the Engineer.

Of these various steps mentioned above, it is evident that the Town did not comply with the first requirement, as there was no necessity for sewerage more than a small portion of the land included in the district, and the farm land, so included, cannot bear the burden of an area sewer tax of the size imposed in this district.

In connection with the third step, I wish to discuss the preparation of the proposal sheet. What is the proposal sheet for? The proposal sheet should contain quantities that will eventually be built into the job as it is possible for the engineer to estimate. This is done in order that the municipality may know before construction starts, what the job is going to cost, and to prevent what are termed "unbalanced bids."

In the case at hand, of the five proposals received, not one of them stated a lump sum for which the contractor would complete the job. Instead, unit prices are quoted opposite each item of work which when multiplied by the quantities and summarized, would equal a lump sum. It is provided in the specifications that any additions to or deductions from the quantities listed would be made at these unit prices.

On the face of the bids received on July 5, 1927, by summarizing the items, the lowest bid was from Kenda Construction Co., Inc., being for \$907,330.30. The next higher bid was from Domenick Spacone and Liberto Cerullo, Inc., being for \$1,022,132.60,- an apparent difference of \$114,802.30 in favor of the Kenda Co. A superficial examination of the items listed in these two bids, and their unit prices, reveals some startling differences. Take the last item in the list, the disposal plant complete. The Kenda Co's bid for this item was \$276,986.50. The Spacone bid for the same item was \$178,240.00, or \$98,746.50 less than the Kenda bid, which when added to the \$114,802.30 difference in the total bids,- makes a difference of \$213.548, that the Kenda Co. is lower than Spacone on the sum of all the other items.

Also, there are some unusual things incorporated in this proposal,- for instance,- in the sewer pipe items there are twenty-four items where a unit price is required but there is no quantity given, to be multiplied by it, to make a figure that will be in the column of totals that produce the lump sum bid on which the contract was let. On six other items, such as special and drop manholes, tunnels, sheeting, pavements, sidewalks and reinforced concrete,- no quantities at all are listed,- so that the prices given have no bearing whatever on the letting of the contract to the apparent low bidder, although the Town paid the contractor \$101,399 for these six items.

Then, too, while 2170 feet of 30" pipe are listed, the Kenda Co. bid only \$1.00 per foot for it, thus effecting their bid to the extent of only \$2,170,- while Spacone bid at the rate of \$22 per foot,- thus effecting his bid to the extent of \$47,740 or \$45,570 more than the Kenda Co. bid. What was the cause of this marked difference? Surely Kenda Co. could not build 30" sewers for \$1 per foot. There was no 30" sewer built.

Then again in the case of the 48" sewer, unit prices were asked on three different depths, while a quantity, 1600 feet, is given for only one depth. The Kenda Co. bid for the 1600 feet is at the rate of \$1 per foot or a total of \$1,600, thus effecting their bid to that extent only,- while Spacone bid at the rate of \$25 per foot, thus

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effecting his bid to the extent of \$40,000 or \$38,400 more than the Kenda Co. bid. Surely Kenda Co. could not build 48" sewers for \$1 per foot. But in this case let us examine the final estimate and see what happened. Only 1031 feet of 48" sewer was laid instead of 1600 feet. Of this amount, 303 feet at a depth of 8 to 10 feet, were paid for at \$18 per foot. No price was bid for this depth, so the price must have been "fixed by agreement between the Contractor and the Engineer." as allowed by paragraph 23 of the specifications. 459 feet, at depths of 18 to 20 feet, 20 to 22 feet, and 22 to 24 feet, were paid for at \$1 per foot, although there was no bid price for 18 to 20 feet depth, and the remaining 248 feet at 24 to 26 feet depth, was paid for at the rate of \$50 per foot. This made a total of \$18,334 that was paid Kenda Co. for 48" sewer, when their bid for this item was only effected to the extent of \$1600.

Another instance of unusual bidding was in the case of "Item No. 5. Concrete for tamping." The Kenda Co.'s bid per cubic yard for about 30,000 cu. yds. of 1 to 12 concrete to be used in tamping back of quarters of various sized pipes and house service risers, was one cent per cu. yd. This effected their bid to the extent of only \$300, while the Spacone bid at \$4.50 per cu. yd. was effected to the extent of \$135,000. The quantity of 1 to 12 concrete that would be required to fulfill the requirements of paragraph 82 of the specifications (i.e. where the depth of the trench is over 14 feet) is around 1100 cu. yds. and the 5669 service risers bid on would require around 400 cu. yds. more, or a total of about 1500 cu. yds. All other quantities of 1 to 12 concrete that might be required, would be furnished in accordance with paragraphs 82 and 83 of the specifications, either "as the Engineer may direct" or "In such places as may be designated by the Engineer". As a matter of fact, the final estimate of Nov. 1, 1928 shows that the Kenda Co. was paid for 2513 cu. yds. at one cent a yard, or \$25.13. The 2513 cu. yds. that the Engineer required the Kenda Co. to install is less than 8 1/2% of the 30,000 cu. yds. the contractors were required to bid on.

It is worthy of note that the Spacone bid for all the sewers except the 30" and 48" was \$529,029.35,- while the Kenda Co. bid for these same sewers, amounted to \$522,181.80,- a difference of only \$6,847.55. While the Spacone bid for the 30" and 48" sewers totaled \$87,740 as against the Kenda bid of \$3,770,- a difference of \$83,970.

But the startling thing in relation to the whole matter of bids and contracts, is this. When the Spacone unit prices given in his bid are applied to the quantities that the Kenda Co. were paid for work allowed by the Engineer in his final estimate of November 1, 1928, the amount is over \$100,000 less than the amount paid the Kenda Co. for this work. In other words, if the contract had been let to Spacone and the Engineer had required Spacone to do the same amount of work that Kenda Co. was paid for, and for items not listed in the proposal, had "fixed" the same prices as paid Kenda Co., the Town would have paid Spacone over \$100,000 less than they paid Kenda Co.



Supervisor Zalemski stated that this meeting had been called for the purpose of renewing the note, that is now outstanding at the Manufacturers and Traders Trust Company of Buffalo, New York.

Mr. Milne, offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, C. CHASE ZALEMSKI, as Supervisor of the Town of Cheektowaga, has reported to this Town Board that insufficient funds are available for the payment of the principal and interest on a certain Certificate of Indebtedness heretofore issued by the Town of Cheektowaga to the Manufacturers & Traders Trust Company of Buffalo, New York, dated July 7th, 1933, in the amount of Two hundred thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) which becomes due and payable on the 5th day of October, 1933 together with interest charges in the further sum of Three thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00), and

WHEREAS, this Town Board, on the 14th day of November, 1932, pursuant to provisions of Article VI A of the Town Law, duly adopted its annual estimates and tax budget for the year 1933 and thereby appropriated for various town purposes, after the deduction of anticipated revenue, the total amount of Six Hundred Eighty Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-six Dollars and Seventy-One Cents (\$680,226.71)

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Erie on the 15th day of November, 1932, duly levied, assessed and provided for the raising by tax upon the real and personal property liable to taxation in the Town of Cheektowaga, the said amount hereinbefore referred to, and

The Supervisor called the meeting to order and stated that the purpose of the meeting was to have a public hearing on the 1934 budget previously filed by the Supervisor.

The Town Clerk then read the proof of posting and publishing of the notices of the hearing and followed by the reading of the proposed budget estimates as hereto filed in his office. After the reading of the aforesaid, the Supervisor asked if there were any objections as to the estimates as read.

Mr. William J. O'Connor, Attorney, representing the Daigler Sand & Gravel Corp., made the following objections:

"I object to any action at this meeting on account of local improvement or district items published, on the ground that Sections 110 and the following sections of the Town Law under which this budget meeting is held and this budget acted upon by the Town Board makes no provisions for the cause of local improvement, and

Further that before local improvement items may be acted upon by the Town Board, the amount of assessment must be ascertained and determined and spread against the improved parcels of property within the district. The taxpayer may have no knowledge of the method of apportionment and spread used by the board.

I also wish to mention the three parcels of property in Sanitary Sewer District #3. I am unfamiliar with whatever method the Town Board is using this year in spreading.

Mr. Zalemski: But you do know the method that was used in the past, don't you?

Mr. O'Connor: I do know that the law provides that they must be used on the basis of benefits derived. This is the first objection I have taken in regard to the manner of levying. This is the first year they have done it.

Mr. Zalemski: How is it that the objection was not raised when the spread was began?

Mr. O'Connor: It was began in the Supreme Court in 19281

Mr. Zalemski: In Cheektowaga?

Mr. O'Connor: Yes, in the Town of Cheektowaga.

Mr. O'Connor: So far as many of the items in the budget are concerned, I think that the items themselves, that is, the arrangement of the items, are very proper.

Mr. O'Connor further objected to the following:

Salary of Councilmen is higher than other towns. Money could be saved. Salary of Town Attorney is higher than similar towns in the County.

Mr. Fisher: But they do not have half as much litigation as the Town of Cheektowaga, has. Have you compared that?

Mr. O'Connor: No, I have never compared it. Salary of Supervisor \$6400.00, is out of line with other towns and is certainly higher than any of the Supervisors in the County. Salary of Assistant to Supervisor is half of the budget for the Town of Tonawanda.

Mr. O'Connor also objected to the Town House telephone items amounting to \$1500.00; Health Officers Salary of \$1800.00; the engineering and preparation of tax rolls and special assessment clerks' salary stating that it is the duty of the Board of Assessors or its services rendered to various special districts and cost must be borne by special districts. It has no part in the general town budget. Should be removed from the general budget.

Mr. Zalemski: For your information, that is being done.  
Mr. O'Connor: We object to the inclusion of the \$4900.00.

Mr. Michael Stachewicz, representing the Walden Avenue Taxpayers Association and also the Central Council of Citizens & Taxpayers Association, stated that they have agreed to have the budget adopted the way it stands at present.

Mr. James Boothroy, taxpayer, gave his comment on the 1934 budget. He stated that the Town of Cheektowaga was the high card on unpaid taxes and also the high card on salaries of the officials stating that the justices' salary was too high, also the Supervisor's compared with the Supervisor of the Town of Hamburg. If all the officials took a cut the taxes might be reduced. In the Town of Tonawanda the Assessors take care of the special districts. Why couldn't they do that here and \$1200.00 could be saved.

Mr. Leo Abeles, representing the Board of Trade, stated that they went over the budget item for item and had no criticism to offer and suggested that the Town Board adopted the budget as it stands.

Supervisor Zalemski then asked if anyone wished to be heard further and there being no further objections he stated that the objections raised would be given due consideration by the Board as a whole and that he would entertain a motion to adjourn.

Frederick K. Wing, presented his final report on sewer district No. 5 which was duly read to the Town Board and on motion of Faber, seconded by Piatek, this report was ordered received and filed for further consideration.

Gentlemen:-

Summary of Reports of Investigation of the Sewerage System in District No. 5, Cheektowaga, contract for which was let to the Kenda Construction Co., in July, 1927.

1st. Progress Report.

The lack of a light test in the specifications for the contract with the Kenda Company, was noted in this report. Attention was also called to location of sewer in open drainage ditch in field. This is a bad location for a sewer. Also, it was noted that storm water from 3000 feet of pavement in Woodbridge Ave. is brought by storm sewer and emptied into this same drainage ditch, - thereby increasing the tendency to destroy the use of the sanitary sewer in two ways, - first, by providing water in a soft filling of the sewer trench, that bores its way down to the sewer and enters it at any leaky joint; and second,

by undermining the sewer, causing uneven settlement and breaking the tile or joints or both. This sewer has now been repaired by the Highway Superintendent,- to remedy these very conditions which were found to exist.

#### 2nd. Progress Report.

This report revealed careless methods in making monthly estimates whereby the Contractor was temporarily overpaid for over 7000 feet of sewer. Also, attention was called to the provision in the specifications (Paragraph 23) whereby "the contractor and the engineer may fix by agreement," a price for work not bid on. This provision should relate to trivial items only. Others should be taken to the Town Board (the representatives of the taxpayers) for approval. The enormity of the wrong practiced in this instance on the taxpayers, is disclosed when the price on over \$80,000 worth of work on the 36" sewer, was fixed by the engineer and the contractor in this manner without competitive bidding. If the engineer had revised his bidding sheet to correspond with his plans,- a lot of trouble and unbalanced bidding could have been avoided. The engineer was negligent when he so failed to revise his bidding sheet. Attention was also called to the unbalanced bidding on 48" reinforced concrete sewer and to the shortage of over 3000 feet in the final estimate for 10" sewer.

#### 3rd Progress Report.

In this report we included blue prints showing condition of manholes and of the ground surface of sewer trenches in the Kenda Co. contract,- so that leaks could be found and repaired. There was also reference to the fact that Mr. Cleveland of New York City designed the sewage disposal plant, and that the plant, on account of leaky sewers, was not capable of taking the flow brought to it. Also that the capacity of the pumps was too large,- resulting in the plant not functioning as it should. Also that the means of drawing sludge is poor. Also that the design of the sludge drying bed was an extravagance. Also that lack of earth filling around Imhoff tank and dosing tanks was poor designing and costly in upkeep,- necessitating the repairing of frozen and cracked piping. Also it was brought out that the taxpayers have had to expend large sums to repair leaks in the sewers that could have been found by the engineer,- had he looked for them,- and which might have been repaired by the contractor without cost to the taxpayers.

#### 4th. Progress Report.

In this report we had the startling news, in a letter from George C. Diehl, C.E., Inc., that the \$4,600 special manhole which had been estimated as 100% complete and paid for on that basis,- was not built at all,- but its price was used as an extra payment on a slightly enlarged booster station. We find that the increase in cost of the booster station would have amounted to only \$1356.50,- so that the engineer allowed \$3,243.50 too much.

Also was brought out the fact that revisions in the plans of the "Dosing Chamber and Chlorinating Plant",- which reduced the cost to the Contractor by about \$5,969, were paid for in full without any deduction. The Taxpayer was again forgotten. Further extravagances were noted at the disposal plant,- such as buying so large a site, fencing it all, and laying out a disposal plant in such an extravagant way,- by having its component elements so far apart that long stretches of costly piping to connect them up, were necessitated. Also extravagances in the way of piping and valves at the Imhoff tank and disturbing the sewage in that tank unnecessarily. Also increased cost of power was brought out, due to lifting the sewage higher than was necessary.

#### 5th. Progress Report.

In this report reference was made to our examination of lateral sewers, and to carelessness in preserving records of their plans and contracts. The 2973 feet of 10" sewer in Roycroft Blvd. built by Kenda Co. and paid for (to the extent of 90%) by separate check for \$7,677.23, was noted. Also was noted that our measurements of sewers built by Kenda Co. under their original contract, check very closely the amounts allowed by the Engineer in the final estimate, with

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the exception of 10" sewers. That our measurements show that apparently Kenda Co. was paid for some 2900 feet of 10" sewer that were unable to find.

Also was noted the finding of large leaks in the piping in the easterly sprinkling filter bed of the disposal plant,- verifying our earlier prediction. When all these leaks are repaired, all of the sewage will be sprayed through nozzles into the air, thereby fulfilling the function of the sprinkling filter,- instead of permitting a large part of the sewage to leak out before its organic content has the opportunity of being oxidized by contact with air. Also was enclosed in this report, a map, #14,185 "C" "C", which showed all the sewers built by Kenda Co. and all lateral sewers. On this map all the manholes are numbered in accordance with our survey and previous prints, and all sizes of sewers are given and note is made of the light test and its result. This will prove very useful in making future repairs.

6th. Progress Report.

This report was confined, first, to criticisms of the disposal plant and recommendations of changes and additions thereto,- and second, to a discussion and analysis of Kenda Construction Company's bid,- showing how Spacone's prices applied to the work actually done, would have cost the Town less.

The criticisms of the disposal plant cover the excessive capacity of the pumps for the service required of them. But rather than try and rebuild them for a smaller capacity,- it is recommended to allow both dosing tanks and sprinkling filters to operate together instead of separately,- thereby preventing the overflowing of the Imhoff tank or dosing tank walls.

The method of discharging sludge from the Imhoff tank to the sludge drying bed is criticized and a better method suggested which would utilize some of the superfluous cast iron pipe in the sludge drying bed and provide a direct pipe connection from the sludge decomposing chamber in the Imhoff tank to the bed. There is one further criticism, namely, that the underdrainage system in the sludge drying bed is not functioning properly, for after the last drawing of sludge, water stood on the surface of the sludge at the lower end of the bed for over a month. Undoubtedly the tile which drains the sludge bed had become clogged. It should be dug up and cleaned and relaid.

Another recommendation was that fill should be placed around the Imhoff tank, and under and around the dosing tanks and over the cast iron piping at the sprinkling filter beds,- to prevent freezing. Another recommendation involving the safety of the operators of the plant, was in regard to iron grating walks and iron railings on top of the Imhoff tank. This is a very important matter and they should be provided and placed at once. Another startling revelation was that the Kenda Company failed to build a reinforced concrete wall just south of the Imhoff tank, as shown on the plans. Its omission should have called for a deduction of about \$2,603.

A recommendation to install a solution feed type of chlorinator in place of the present dry feed, is one that should be acted upon at an early date. Quite a detailed discussion was contained in this report about the Kenda Construction Company's contract. Also a demonstration that if the contract had been let to Spacone and the Engineer had required Spacone to do the same amount of work that Kenda Co. was paid for, and for items not listed in the proposal, had "fixed" the same prices as paid Kenda Co.,- the Town would have paid Spacone over \$100,000 less than they paid Kenda Co.

In conclusion,- the Town has made good progress in putting its sewerage system in this district in condition so that eventually it will be 100% efficient.

They have dug up the sewers and repaired them at the points where they leaked most. We have just made an examination of the condition of the sewer trenches of the Kenda Contract and are enclosing herewith prints showing their present condition. This shows a great many repairs have been made and shows those that can be cared for later.

Repair work on the easterly sprinkling filter bed has progressed to the extent that we are sure, when it is completed, that this unit of the disposal plant will function as it should.

The Town is doing as well as it can in the operation of its disposal plants, - with its present personal. At some future time we will suggest methods of improving this supervision.

Gentlemen:

You recently asked my opinion as to the eligibility of town officers. It is clearly explained in Section 23 of the Town Law which goes in effect January 1st, 1934. It reads as follows:

"Eligibility of town officers. Every officer of the town at the time of his election or appointment and throughout his term of office, shall be an elector of the town and every electige officer shall be the owner of record of real property in the town at the time of his election and throughout his term of office. No county treasurer, district superintendent of schools or trustee of a school district shall be eldgable to the office of supervisor."

As to who are officers of the Town, Section 20, Subdivision 5 of the Town Law, reads as follows:

"The term "officer" and/or "officers" whenever used in this chaptershall include the incumbents of the offices of supervisor, councilman, town clerk, justice of the peace, superintendent of highways, assessor, receiver of taxes and assessments and collector, or any of them."

Section 20, Subdivision 2A also provided for theestablishment of the office of the Town Attorney and Town Engineer and reads as follows:

"The town board of every town of the first class, and of every town of thesecond class which shall have adopted the budget system, may establish the office of town attorney or town engineer, or both. If the town board shall so establish the office of town attorney or town engineer, or both, it shall fix the salary of such officer or officers. In addition the town board of any such town may employ counsel to the town attorney in respect to any particular subject matter, proceeding or litigation, or it may employ such expert engineering service in respect to any particular subject matter, improvement or proceeding as it may necessarily require."

Gentlemen:

You have asked my opinion as to the status of veterans holding appointed positions with the Town Government. I call your attention to Section 22 of the Civil Service Law which reads as follows:

"Power of Removal Limited. Every person whose rights may be in any way prejudiced contrary to any of the provisions of this section shall be entitled to a writ of mandamus to remedy the wrong.

1. Removal of veterans and volunteer firemen. No person holding a position by appointment or employment in the State of New York or in the several cities, counties, towns or villages thereof who is an honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine, having served as such in the union army or navy of the United States during the war of the rebellion, or who is an honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine, having served as such in the army or navy of the United States during the late war with Spain, or during the incidental insurrection in the Phillipines prior to July fourth, nineteen hundred and two, or in the World War, or who shall have served the term required by law in the volunteer fire department of any city, town or village in the state, or who shall have been a member thereof at the time of the disbandment of such volunteer fire department shall be removed from such position except for incompetency or misconduct shown after a hearing upon due notice upon stated charges, and with the right of such employee or appointee to a review by writ of certiorari. If the position so held by any such honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine or volunteer fireman shall become unnecessary or be abolished for reasons of economy or otherwise, the said honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine or volunteer fireman holding the same shall not be discharged from the public service but shall be transferred to any branch of the said service for duty in such position as he may be fitted to fill, receiving the same compensation therefor, and it is hereby made the duty of all persons clothed with power of appointment to make such transfer effective. The burden of proving incompetency or misconduct shall be upon the person alleging the same. Hearings upon charges pursuant to this subdivision shall be held by the officer or body having the power to remove the person charged with incompetency or misconduct or by a deputy or other employee of such officer or body designated in writing for that purpose. In case a deputy or other employee is so designated he shall, for the purpose of such hearing, be vested with all the powers of such officer, or body, and shall make a record of such hearing which shall, with his recommendation, be referred to such officer or body for review and decision."



A quorum being present the chairman called the meeting to order to transact any and all business that may come before the Board.

Mr. Fisher, Town Attorney stated that in his opinion a conference should be held at this time between the members of the police department and Mr. William S. Rann as counsel for the petitioners in reference to the matter of the application of John Bogacki for an order of Mandamus vs. C. Chase Zalemski and other as members of the Town Board for back salaries from January 1, 1932 to July 1st, 1932 stating that he thought that some satisfactory figure could be reached and be to the best interest of all concerned.

Mr. Rann asked if a recess could be taken so that he could confer with the police officers present.

This was granted and a recess was taken for fifteen minutes.

RESOLVED, that the pay of all police officers involved in the above entitled action be computed and paid upon the difference between the amounts actually received and at the rate of \$120.00 per month from January 1st, 1932 to July 1st, 1932.

Supervisor Zalemski asked for a roll call on the ammendment which resulted as follows: Sturm, Eberl, Faber and Zalemski, voted for the ammendment, Piatek and Milne voted against, the ammendment was carried and the original motion was lost.

After some discussion between the police officers and their council, Mr. Rann, it was decided to accept the offer of the Town Board at the rate of \$120.00 per month excepting, Mr. Arthur Barrett and Amedeo L. Cappola who refused.

Mr. Louis Kozlowski, addressed the Board requesting that they restore his back pay from January 1, 1932 to July 1, 1932 during that period of time when he was off duty due to sickness.


